Discipleship as a Wheel



I have been crucified with Christ. It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me. And the life I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me.

Galatians 2:20 (ESV)

We are dead. That is our old sinful nature. We died in Christ when we were baptized. Our old sinful nature was drowned and what Jesus did on the cross, namely paid for our sin, was applied to us. So Paul says in the verse above, "I have been crucified with Christ. It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me."

As disciples of Christ, when people see us they should see Jesus. If he lives in us, then it should be evident. Think of our life in Christ as a wagon wheel. In the center is the hub. Connected to the hub are the spokes which are held in place by the outer rim. The hub is Christ, the spokes are different aspects of our life as a disciple: Prayer, Word, Witnessing, Fellowship, Stewardship and Service.

When the wheel turns, we do not see the individual spokes, only the hub. It is the same in our life as a disciple—our goal is for the Holy Spirit to transform our lives in Christ's likeness so that He is preeminent in our lives. The visible hub (Christ) is the driving force behind the wheel's movement. When we realize all that Christ has done for us we are moved to give and live our lives to and for Him. When Jesus is Lord of our lives we are engaged in Christ's body the Church and our lives are moved to pray to God, to read and study His Word, to give of our income as He has blessed us, to be in fellowship with His people, to witness of our faith by telling others what Jesus has done for us and can do for them and to serve others by helping to supply their daily needs.

All of this is held in place by our lives lived in obedience to Jesus' commands. And we do these things, not because we have to, but because we want to. We are so appreciative of what Jesus has done and is doing for us that we want to love Him and do what He wants us to do.

Jesus tells us in John 14:15-17 (ESV) "If you love me, you will keep my commandments. And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Helper, to be with you forever, even the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees him nor knows him. You know him, for he dwells with you and will be in you.

Do you love Jesus? Then it will be evident in your living your life in obedience to Jesus' commands—the main one being to love one another as He has loved us. This way people will know we are His disciples. (John 13:35) The main thing however, is that we do not confuse the means with the end. Perfecting our witness, improving our prayer life, etc. is not the end. The end is knowing Christ as Lord. Our means to get there is through reading God's Word, prayer, witnessing, serving, giving, etc. But again, our goal is not to perfect the means, but to know Christ.

To help us better understand this I am going to be preaching a sermon series on Discipleship as a Wheel during the month of October. I want to encourage you to bring your Bible and a note pad to take notes with on the sermons. This will help you to retain what I say and what you hear. This will also help you grow in your use of God's Word.

The schedule is as follows:



Stewardship Committee Report – 2017 Proposed Budget

Cam Ritchie, Stewardship Committee Chairman presented the proposed 2017 budget that had been developed and approved by the Stewardship Committee at the recent annual budget workshop. See attached proposed budget for more information and details.

Madeline Zieverink informed Council that the waterproofing fund account has an average daily balance of over \$19,000. She brought a recommendation from the Stewardship committee to move \$10,000 of this fund over to the building and property maintenance fund. That would leave \$9,000 in the waterproofing fund. This came as a motion to Council from the Stewardship Committee. The motion was seconded and approved by unanimous voice vote. This will be sent back to the Stewardship Committee who will revise the budget proposal and come back to Council with a final, revised budget in October. Once approved by Council, the proposed 2017 budget will then go to the congregation for a vote in November.

Brighten the Beacon

Richard Crouch, Brighten the Beacon Committee Chairman, informed Council of the results of the recent congregation poll regarding the next phase of the Master Plan project. Architect Bill Burgin is working on a possible 4th option that would incorporate an outdoor shelter/pavilion with a new fellowship hall in one structure. Bill Burgin will provide drawings of this new option at no cost to the church. This new option, along with the results of the recent poll will be presented to the congregation in the near future.

Wall of Faith

As part of the recent basement renovation project (Smith Assembly Hall) a wall of faith (wall of crosses) will be created on the wall near the sound control booth. A motion to proceed with this project was presented, seconded and approved by Council. More details on this project will be available in the near future.
