"In my Father's house are many rooms. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you?" John 14:2

We cannot begin to express to you what it has meant to us to live in the beautiful house you provided for us. And you have allowed us to make it our home and respected our privacy to raise our family there. But in four years when I retire, I don't want to be moving out of the parsonage. So while Kathy and I both have our health, we're going to build now and move in when it is completed.

When I told someone we were building, they commented "Oh, you're building your forever home." No, Jesus built our forever home; we're building our home to live out our days here on earth. That's the other thing we all need to keep in mind. As the old hymn goes "this world is not my home, I'm just a passin' through…" If we have a place to call home, while we're here on earth, we're blessed. But it's more important for us to have a place in heaven to call home that Jesus has prepared just for us. For that is where we will spend eternity.

So we thank you for the parsonage and the years we've lived in it. We thank Jesus for our *forever home*, and we look forward to living in our new home later this year.

Concerns, Receptions and Approvals

Present:

- President, Cam Ritchie noted that options for the Smith Hall hot water heater are pending. Jason Smith verbally shared several options for gas water heaters including larger capacity and tankless from Medley Electric to increase capacity and recovery time. The council asked Jason to prepare a written summary of these options including estimated costs, installation considerations and estimated operating expense. The summary will also include a tankless electric water heater option suggested by Boni Lowry.
- An overview of the presentation and ballot for congregational meeting in Smith hall at 9:30 am was shared at this time. Richard Crouch will begin with a historical timeline leading up to the meeting today. Jim Duncan and Dan Norman from Ramsey, Burgin, Smith Architects will present the proposed building design followed by Branson Pethel with details of the funding option. After Q&A and the Call for the Question the meeting will resume in the sanctuary with a ballot vote.
- A \$100 donation was approved to Mountain View Primitive Baptist Church in thanks for the consultations provided by Tim Goodman during our research process for the Safety and Security taskforce.

March 11, 2018 council minutes were approved as presented.

The Financial Report for March, 2018 was presented and explained by Laurie Ritchie, Treasurer.

March income was \$748 above budget with expense \$1839 below budget.

Y-T-D income was \$1862 under budget with expenses \$1082 over budget.

Items of note included:

Funds collected for The Lords Harvest during Lent were \$1970. This does not include funds given on Easter Sunday.

Adjustment to the Pastor's Shared Housing allowance was made for February and March.

Refunds for copier maintenance and QuickBooks totaling \$819 were received.

General Fund spendable cash was \$52,977 at the end of March.

March contributions to the Master Plan in march were \$1200

The financials were approved as presented.

Reception of:

Pastor's Report for January

The pastor's report for February was presented and accepted as submitted.

Thrive Youth Report for January

The youth director's report was presented and accepted as submitted.

Prayerful Consideration of Council Matters

Stewardship Committee: Fundraiser guidelines were approved as presented.

- The committee suggested a reminder in newsletter and other appropriate places that the B2B monthly meals are fundraisers. This is in response to declining donations at recent meals.
- Laurie shared that the church is missing the opportunity for sales tax reimbursement when purchases are made by individuals and submitted for reimbursement rather than purchases made
- up-front in the church's name. As chairman of the property committee, Jason Smith makes regular and sometimes large purchases on the church's behalf and use of the church credit card will allow Laurie to request reimbursement from the State for the sales tax. *A motion was unanimously approved to provide a church credit card for Jason Smith with a credit line of \$2500.*
- Property Committee: The fellowship hall ice maker is not working. Jason Smith presented the following options: repair electronics of the current ice maker (\$750), purchase a used ice maker with a 30 day warranty (\$1500), or purchase a new ice maker with a one year warranty (\$2700). It was noted that the ice maker is at least 15 years. A motion to purchase a new ice maker not to exceed \$2700 was unanimously approved. Monies will be taken from the building fund.

- Jason asked that the air conditioner in the choir room be turned off when the room is not in use. This unit was installed as a supplemental air source only.
- Repairs to the broken areas in the asphalt of the main driveway have been patched several times over the years. Jason shared that more extensive repairs rather than patching are needed. The estimated cost is \$3000. The council asked Jason to provide a written bid for these repairs.
- **Social Ministry:** Christiana served the evening and morning meals at Rowan Helping Ministries on March 22 and March 23rd.

Evangelism Committee: Next meeting: April 12th

Brighten the Beacon Committee: Committee will meet after congregational meeting.

Landscape: Everything is growing

- **Health Care Committee:** Requested meeting with Pastor Carl to discuss details for space approved for first aid supply storage. It was noted the Safety & Security Taskforce had a similar interest in utilizing this space for emergency assistance and council suggested these groups discuss mutual uses.
- LCW
- **SLC:** Council approved a request from the Sister Lucille Circle to 'refresh' the elevator lobby. No funding from the church will be requested and no major renovations such as painting will be included. It is primarily furniture, rug, upholstery and accessories.
- **MKL**: Will meet at Trinity Oaks Health and Rehab for an upcoming meeting. Charlotte shared that their group is still looking for a permanent space in the church for the quilting group. The space needs to be large enough to accommodate a quilting frame and a reasonably secure space where sewing machines and supplies can be left on site.

CLM: Approximately 450 chicken halves were sold at the BBA on 3/23. Estimate of funds raised: \$2000-\$2300 **Bus Committee**: No report.

Scout Committee: Boni shared issues they have with their current bank accepting checks payable to Christiana rather than Troop 317. They are currently holding several checks the bank will not negotiate. Vickie will determine if F&M will allow the checks to be deposited to the Christiana general fund so that a check can be written to them in the name of Troop 317. Boni will determine what requirements the Scout district may have for establishing a new account at Christiana and they can proceed to open a new account.

Prayerful Consideration:

- The Safety and Security taskforce is actively organizing sub-groups for various areas of the safety plan. Chair, Jim Duncan shared the group will be called the Nehemiah Group. *A motion to purchase communication equipment for those assisting with worship service security in an amount not to exceed \$1200 was unanimously approved. Monies will come from the general fund as an unbudgeted item.* A discussion followed regarding miscellaneous expenses that will be incurred such as background checks and signage. *A motion to establish an operating budget of \$2000 for 2018 was unanimously approved. Monies will be moved from the general fund to a dedicated line item on the balance sheet.*
- Pastor Carl shared that Ann Renegar is planning to sell her house which adjoins the church property and is offering the church 'first refusal' for the purchase. The council indicated an interest in this purchase and requested Past Carl and Cam follow-up with Ann for the purchase price and additional details.

Christiana Congregational Meeting April 8, 2018

On Sunday, April 8, 2018 a special Congregational meeting was held at Christiana Lutheran Church for the purpose of voting on the Brighten the Beacon committee proposal to go out for bids on Stages 1 & 2 of the proposed Beacon Center building and to approve the funding plan for the project. This meeting was originally scheduled to take place on June 25, 2017 but was postponed due to unforeseen circumstances.

The meeting was called to order by Cam Ritchie, president, in the Smith Assembly Hall who asked for a motion to waive the reading of the previous congregational meeting's minutes which was made and approved.

The motion from the Council was read as follows:

The June 2017 postponed congregational meeting be rescheduled to the earliest possible date, at which time the Beacon Center design and funding package - as originally approved by council be presented to the congregation for a vote.

Richard Crouch; Chairman of the Brighten the Beacon committee provided a historical overview of the actions of the committee, council and congregation leading up to this meeting.

Pastor Carl Haynes prayed for the deliberations of the meeting.

Jim Duncan and Dan Norman from Ramsey, Burgin, Smith, Architects then presented information relating to the building design which included 3D visuals of the building concept with cost management options. Discussion included various details and pricing options for the project.

Branson Pethel shared details of the funding package. The Master Plan has a current balance of \$438,000. In order to complete the project the church would be required to borrow \$1million to be paid back over 8 years; \$800,000 would be borrowed from a charitable foundation at no interest, \$200,000 would be a conventional loan borrowed from a financial institution. A hypothetical example was given of \$105 per month per giving unit for 8 years in addition to their current benevolent contributions. Discussion included alternate financing approaches and examples of other congregation's successful outcomes borrowing funds in this range.

There being no further discussion, there was a call for the question and the meeting moved to the sanctuary for the ballot vote. Cam Ritchie read the ballot as follows:

<u>Yes</u> - The members of Christiana will borrow a sum not to exceed \$1 million to complete the project as presented.
AND
I, as a member, agree to personally support the repayment of this loan to the best of my ability.
AND
I approve the design and submitting it for bid
NO - I do not support this plan.

Ninety-five (95) ballots were collected. Yes: 4 No: 89 Abstained: 2 The vote for the Brighten the Beacon proposal did not pass.

Cam Ritchie closed the congregational meeting.
