BITS OF HISTORY

After our church building was completely destroyed by fire in March of 1945, the congregation, friends and family of the congregation, other churches, and the community worked to build the brick building where we worship today. The building was completed in 1948 (debt free!) at the cost of \$120,000.00. A dollar in 1945 would be worth \$14.63 in 2021, so the cost of the building today would be about \$1,756,000.00.

The Building Committee members were: Odell Lingle, General Chairman and Chairman of the Planning Committee; P. J. Lyerly, Chairman of the Finance Committee; P.H. Lyerly, Treasurer; L.R. Cauble, in charge of Construction; W.O. Brown; Carl Cross; Lester Eller (deceased 8-21-47); Leon Hamilton; A.B. Honeycutt; Lee Kluttz; Roy Lingle; E.L. Lyerly; C.H. Lyerly (deceased 10-19-46); Claude Lyerly.

The pews cost \$115 each (1945 value). The stained glass windows cost \$130.50 each (1945 value). Small name plates on them give the name of the donor(s).

The Altar and Reredos (wooden altarpiece or "wall" behind the altar) were given "In Honor of the Young Men Who served in the U.S. Forces During World War II" by the congregation.

The large stained glass window above the balcony was given "To The Glory of God and In Appreciation of the Prayers of Their Home Congregation by the Veterans of World War II." All 37 returned from the war.

Another Form



"After these things he (Jesus) appeared in another form to two of them, as they were walking into the country."

Mark 16:12

In Luke's account of the Resurrection he tells the story of two disciples walking on the road to their home in Emmaus. They are sad and confused about Jesus' death and supposed rising from the dead. They felt hopeless and decided to leave the other disciples and go home. As they traveled, Jesus joins

them. Luke records that "their eyes were kept from recognizing him."

I have often wondered how they were kept from recognizing Jesus, especially when he interpreted the Scriptures to them about how the Christ was prophesied to suffer and die and rise from the death. Movies I've seen about this showed Jesus with his face covered by a hood or his prayer shawl. I found that a bit hokey. Still I pondered, "How were their eyes kept from recognizing Jesus?"

Mark gives us the answer in his account of this incident— "he appeared to them in another form." Of course! In his post resurrection body Jesus is able to change forms, change his appearance if needed. And that's what he did to keep Cleopas and his companion from recognizing Jesus. The Good News translation says: "He did not look as he usually did." The Passion Translations reads: "appearing in a form they did not recognize." The NIV records: "Jesus appeared in a different form..."

By changing his appearance Jesus was able to keep the two men from recognizing him and so focus their attention on his teaching them what the Scriptures had to say about his suffering, death and resurrection. When the three men arrived at Cleopas' home, "the stranger" was invited to stay the night and have dinner. Jesus accepted. At dinner he did a most presumptuous thing, he assumed the role of the host and took the bread and blessed it. At that moment Jesus changed his form to the one the disciples recognized and their eyes were opened and they recognized him in the breaking of the bread.

Luke records that Jesus then disappeared from their sight. Excited, the two men got up from the dinner table and hurried back to Jerusalem to tell the other disciples Jesus was indeed risen from the dead!

Today Jesus appears to us in "another form"—the bread and wine of Holy Communion. For those of us with the eyes of faith, we see Jesus in, with, and under the form of bread and wine and know it is his body and blood given and shed for us for the forgiveness of our sin.

Not only do we see Jesus in this form, but we are blessed to touch and taste him and take him into ourselves to receive the gracious gifts of forgiveness and eternal life. Believing this, partaking of our Lord's body and blood is something we want to do often. We should plan our lives around receiving this Sacrament. It is that important.

Luther reminds us that this Sacrament is for sinners, so we do not come to the Lord's Table in fear and trepidation, but in joyful anticipation, believing full well that we eat and drink in faith for the forgiveness of our sin.

And as we eat and drink, we are commanded by Jesus to "do this in remembrance of me." We remember that Jesus took on our human form for the expressed purpose of suffering and dying on the cross to pay for our sin. And he rose from the dead to assure us that by believing in him we have the promised hope of eternal life.

Trusting this promise we take to heart the words of the Preface in our liturgy: It is indeed right and salutary that we should at all times and in all places offer thanks and praise to You, O Lord, holy Father, through Christ our Lord; who on this day, overcame death and the grave, and by his glorious resurrection opened to us the way of everlasting life. He will come again one day to judge the living and the dead. And so, with the Church on earth and the host of heaven, We praise your name and join their unending hymn...

May we receive our Lord Jesus in the form of the bread and wine with thanksgiving and sing his praises forever!



Schedule to be done cooking by 10am

Continuing work on Favorite Scripture Devotion. Only have 15 turned in at this point and hoping to get about 50 more.

Will introduce a 14-day LovedBibleProject for this summer's TRIP Bible reading process.
