David Preslar and Pastor Carl attended the NALC Convocation online August 7 & 8. The 7th was at David's home and the 8th was at Pastor's Carl's home. The agenda consisted of voting for pastors and laity for various committees, voting on constitutional amendments—among them was to go to having convocations every other year (we will ratify this at our annual congregational meeting in November), and passing a budget of \$2,065,615.

We celebrated congregational anniversaries including Organ Lutheran in Salisbury—275 years.

While this saved us considerable dollars—\$50 in registration—I'm looking forward to gathering in person in 2021. Friday's session was 3 hours; Saturday's was 7 hours. All in all, this was better than having no convocation.

FROMTHE

So Far, So Good

Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others. Philippians 2:4

PASTOR We have been worshipping in the Sanctuary at Christiana since June 14th. As of this writing we have had no one contract the coronavirus as a result of gathering for worship in person. Most folks wear a mask and practice social distancing. I believe this has kept us safe thus far. That and the fact that members have been conscientious of not coming to worship if they feel bad or suspect they have had a contact with someone who has tested positive.

Another possible reason we have had no COVID-19 outbreak is because we have not been singing. That has been hard on those of us who love to sing; but consider this: singing really throws out our air particles – 16 to 20 feet! Speaking throws them out only 3-4 feet. Singing makes for the possibility of spreading the virus way past the suggested physical distancing of 6 feet. This is fact.

Becky and I have been discussing the idea of resuming singing under the following conditions: hymns are printed in the bulletin; we sit and hold our bulletins down and sing into our laps; we sing softly while wearing a mask. We have held off on implementing this until we saw what happened once schools started back. Most experts figured colleges and universities would have outbreaks within a week of students coming back on campus. And sure enough, students got together without taking the precautions of masks or social distance and cases occurred as expected. Now many campuses have gone completely to online classes for undergraduate studies.

Here in Rowan County we've seen cases at some of the schools, but not to the extent that schools have closed and gone to online learning for everyone. Who knows what the future will hold? God. God alone knows what the future holds. And while he does not reveal the future to us, he does promise to be with us as we live into the future. God also gives us his Word to guide us.

If we as disciples of Jesus follow his Word, we find that life goes better. Especially in regards to our love and concern for one another. Philippians 2:3-4 says, *Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility count others more significant than yourselves. Let each of you look not only to his own interests, but also to the interests of others.* Because of our love and concern for one another, we willingly set aside our interests and seek to do what's best so that we can continue to come together for worship and fellowship.

When we follow God's Word and seek to live in obedience to it, we find that life is simplified. In my own life I don't have to struggle with decisions of should I do this or not. God's Word gives me direction for the purpose of giving me the freedom to live my life in him, doing his will.

Had those students on college and university campuses listened to their administrators and adhered to safe practices, classes would probably still be open. But because they ignored the authorities and put their interests before those of others, campuses are shut down and everyone suffers.

We've been fortunate at Christiana to not have had any cases of the virus as a result of our coming together. So far, so good. I hope and pray it stays that way. I missed seeing you, worshipping with you when we were only having services live on Facebook. Yes, we could sing that way, but if not singing, means we can come together, worship and fellowship, partake of our Lord's body and blood, then I will willingly not sing. Being with you, my brothers and sisters in Christ is worth far more than any sacrifice it takes for us to be together safely.

I hope you feel the same way too. Keep in mind that this pandemic won't last forever and that when it is over we will be glad we sacrificed our interests to be together safely. Being with you in worship is one of the things that keeps me sane through these perilous times. May God bless us and keep us safe as we seek to do his will.

Concerns, Receptions and Approvals:

Council meeting minutes and congregational minutes for July 12, 2020 were approved with the addition of LaVaughn Beaver in attendance by zoom.

July envelope offering was above budget \$1,393.72 with year to date above \$7,449.70.

July income was above budget \$930.71 with year to date \$5,676.91 above budget.

July expenses were under budget \$3,645.88

Year to date expenses under budget \$31,110.93.

Spendable cash (Cash on Hand-new name) as of July 31, 2020 was \$60,329.19.

Contributions to Brighten the Beacon Fund in July were \$3,444.00.

Pastors Report for July 2020 was received with special notes of two funerals: Doris Pethel and Roy Stollery (Madeline Zieverink's brother-in-law). VBS was conducted online this year with several families participating. Made several home visits which included communion.

Committee & Auxiliary Reports:

Stewardship: Bank Loan: Stewardship Committee discussed the possibility of using another \$30,000 (or less) from spendable cash (cash on hand) in the General Fund to pay down the principle on the F&M Bank loan for the Fellowship Hall project. This measure would greatly decrease interest on the loan but would not release the congregation of their pledge/contribution commitments for this amount. The designated amount would be repaid to the General Fund with continued contributions to BTB. Council will notify the Stewardship Committee to make a recommendation to Council regarding the designated amount to pay towards the F&M loan with the possibility of scheduling this for a congregational vote at our Annual Congregational Budget vote in November 2020.

Christian Education: Discussions have been held about the possibility of opening up Sunday School for Middle School and up. Lower grades will still be conducted online. The Men's Sunday School class and the Peggy Boggs' Sunday School classes will join together and meet in the Fellowship Hall.

Property: Will be replacing the fluorescent lights near the ceiling in the sanctuary and stain glass window at altar with LED lights.

Evangelism: The Loved Bible project has begun. Sixty Bibles have been purchased and 14 individuals have signed up thus far. **Landscape**: Mulch has been spread under the crepe myrtle trees on the side of the church by ProMow. This mulch was left over from another job and was donated to the church. Kevan Barringer comes by weekly to water the flowers and plants and a thank you was extended for his time and effort in keeping our landscape in such beautiful in all seasons.

Nehemiah Group: Scott Kelsoe has turned in his resignation as lead on this committee effective July 2021. The committee will discuss and decide on a new lead.

Youth: A meeting was held to discuss ideas on how to involve the youth during this time of Covid-19 and several outdoor activities were suggested. A leader (possible church member) is needed to help sponsor this group.

Brighten the Beacon: Dedication of the newly enlarged Fellowship Hall is today. A huge thank you was given to Jason Smith for all of his time, effort and dedication in overseeing the construction through to its completion.

LCW-Miss Katherine Lyerly-Having discussions on trying to start meetings again.

Prayerful Consideration of Council Matters:

Fellowship Hall Dedication-Dedication is today at the end of our worship service.

Fellowship Hall Usage Guideline/Agreement- these were discussed with several changes to be made.

Sharing those scripture passages that have inspired and motived you to do God's work! Be a blessing that leads other to Christ!

You'll select your favorite passages from the Bible highlighting them and leaving notes on why that passage is an inspiration to you. Leave bookmarks and cards concerning scripture that brings you closer to Gods kingdom. Most importantly, have fun sharing God's word to those in need of it!!

When you're done with the process the Bible you have completed will be turned back in and given to someone seeking to understand the importance of God's word. At this point we will be providing these bibles to the Pregnancy Support Center of Rowan County and Rowan Helping Ministries or to someone you know in need of His Word. We will be tracking where our Loved Bibles end up.


