

The Cost of Freedom

For freedom Christ has set us free; stand firm therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery.

Galatians 5:1

Through my years of ministry our country has gone through a number of foreign wars and conflicts sending men and women in the military overseas to fight. During those times I was keenly aware of the cost of freedom. Many of the men and women saw and experienced things no young person should have to witness. I prayed for their safe return

knowing full well many of them would come home scarred physically, mentally, and emotionally; and others would not return alive. They are the ones who paid the ultimate price with their lives. That is the cost of freedom—the lives of those who are willing to serve their country no matter what.

Many of the men and women today serving on foreign soil will come home to their loved ones. They too, will have given of their lives so that we might be free here in the United States of America. But some of them will come home and have a hard time of it. Troubled with PTSD (Post Traumatic Stress Disorder), they will be haunted night and day by the horrors they experienced. They will have a hard time with relationships—family and/or friends. Holding down a job, if they can find one, will be difficult. Some, no longer able to cope, will commit suicide. Tragic.

War is tragic. It is the product of sin, period. It is the result of sinful people not able to get along and think the only way to resolve the problem is to fight. Sometimes when an aggressor seeks to conquer others for their own evil purposes, others are forced to respond in defense. If they want to protect their rights, their freedom, and the freedom of others they feel compelled to fight back.

I'm looking forward to that day when Christ will return and bring into being his Kingdom and an end to all wars. But in the meantime, it's a mean time and we have to put up with war. However, for those of us who are followers of Christ, we know from Scripture that ultimately the cost our freedom is not based on the might of our country's military—it is based on Jesus Christ sacrificing his life for ours.

In the above scripture passage we learn that Christ has set us free from our sin to be free, to live free and he advises us to not submit again to the slavery of sin. We can live in the freest country in the world and still be enslaved to sin. Through his death and resurrection Jesus has defeated sin, death and the devil and made it possible for us to be truly free. As a result, we could live in the most enslaved country in the world and be truly free in Christ Jesus. Our Lord says in John 8: *"If the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed."*

We are truly free, when by his grace, Jesus Christ forgives us of our sin and gives us hope of eternal life. We are free from sin to live by the Spirit. Paul tell us in Galatians 5:16: *"So I say, live by the Spirit, and you will not gratify the desires of the sinful nature."*

The best way we can honor God is to live our lives in the freedom Christ has graciously given us. The best way we can honor those who are serving overseas or here at home in the military for their sacrifice is to pray for them, to support them, and work here at home to make America a country that is truly free in Christ Jesus.
